Nineteen sleepless hours into what would turn out to be a much longer day of wrenching, the cars maiden voyage was a drive downtown and lunch at The Double Wide Grille. What a morning, the car was running great, the location and company were amazing, and lunch with good friends tied up what appeared to be a reward for all the hard work. As we parted with friends old and new, fate decided to call encore on the previous night's garage performance. That encore came in the form of an expanding puddle of blue fluid underneath the 02. Luckily, our good friends, Team Cunningham "The Mini contingent", stepped up to help us rectify the multiple coolant leaks and the driveshaft flex joint that looked cracked but was in fact, in four separate pieces. Seven hours later, wrenches and rags are put away and the car is ready for the transport truck.

If you must shake down a newly built track car, I heartilv recommend Laurels Grade Road in Carmel, the road and the scenery are sublime. Life was good, car was getting better every run, and we even found a hassle- free source for racing



fuel (no small feat in California). Time to drain the bucket list a little and unleash the car onto historic Laguna Seca. Assigned to group A (for the track novices, that's the group full of tuned M's, Ferraris, Vipers and 'Vettes... and this day a 44 year old 4 cyl BMW sedan.. I entered with the full intention of taking it easy the first session in deference to the less than 100 miles on fresh build.. Three or four laps later and all intentions were out the window, the car insisted on it, I swear... Twenty minutes later (felt like no time at all), my session was ending and the car was performing fantastic. I came into the paddock and my brother Jim would start his session. A quick pep talk, and out onto

the track he went. I watched from behind the pit wall as he warmed to the car and started to slide the car through turn 11 onto the front straight lap after lap. Then it happened.. I did not see the car for about 10 minutes. Something has obviously went wrong, and the only comfort was the other cars were still running and the ambulances were not being dispatched. No word until the session was ending and I saw the car coming into the pits under its own power, and there was nothing external to indicate what had happened. I soon found out that coming into turn 5 before an uphill section, the quick disconnect throttle cable had come off, handcuffing the Weber side drafts to idle.

After a quick and thorough repair we went to our respective class room sessions to reflect and give our minds a tune up (the "Education" in Performance Driving Education). I was up next, and took to the track with aplomb, throttle was there, tires were great, all gauges in the green, what a great track and the car couldn't be working better. Until it wasn't... Half way through the session coming through the tight second gear turn 11, onto the front straight the clutch pedal and clutch master decided to part ways. For the uninitiated, that means the clutch pedal was now just for show. So as not to be a hazard in the fastest part of the track, I went off at the beginning of the front straight.

I then got a nice ride on the track flatbed back to the pits. Looks like Iim's next session would be seen from under the car in the garage, fixing the clutch and going over everything we'd touched once again.

Last session of the day, I promised my brother I would not break the car on track so he could at least have one full session. I went out and the car was running superb and I was drifting the car through turn 11 along with a spec E30 and chasing down an E46 M3.

I pulled into the paddock and Jim was anxiously waiting to get behind the wheel. He's already in the car and tightening the harnesses when my instructor and I see it. A huge amount of fluid pouring out from un-



derneath the car. Oil level was fine, brake and clutch fluid fine, it wasn't coolant, only the transmission was left, but it was coming out much too fast to be

a seal problem.. The only thing that was immediately clear was that our day was finished.

We pushed the car back to the garage and removed the inspection plate on the transmission to try to get some idea what we were facing.

The lay shaft bearing plug had come out, this is a ~50mm is a pressed in plug in the front of the transmission at the bottom (explains the waterfall earlier). We talked with several 2002 gurus including the always amicable Mike Self and he said he never heard of one of those coming out. Bitter disappointment, as we would not be able to compete in the next day's autocross. So wins and losses, back to Pittsburgh and back to the drawing board. Of all the times and wavs that could have failed, where it failed was the safest for our car and everyone else's that day, and I even kept my promise.

Allegheny Chapter Updates By-Laws

Club Issues Revisions of Rules July 31, 2016

ARTICLE 1 - NAME

The name of the corporation is Allegheny Chapter, BMW Car Club of America, Incorporated. (Hereinafter referred to as the "club")

ARTICLE 2 – PURPOSE

Insofar as permitted to corporations incorporated under the Non-Profit Corporation Law of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the purpose is to enhance the BMW ownership experience for members by providing publications, services, support, information and activities that promote camaraderie and encourage social awareness and individual responsibility.

ARTICLE 3 – LOCATION

Meetings will be held at a location chosen by the President or the Board of Directors. For corporate matters, the address of the club shall be the Post Office Box listed on the chapter website.

ARTICLE 4 - MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. Members of the Allegheny Chapter are limited to members of the BMW CAR CLUB OF AMERICA. INCORPORATED, who are assigned to the Allegheny Chapter by the BMW CCA, INC.

SECTION 2. Any member may be removed for non-payment of dues or action determined to be detrimental to the club by a 2/3 vote of the Direc-

ARTICLE 5 – ELECTIONS

SECTION 1. Any member may nominate a member in good standing by submitting a petition, in writing, countersigned by the nominee. Nominating petitions may be submitted via email with one message from the nominator and an acceptance message from the nominee. All nominees for office must have been members in good standing for at least six months prior to the annual meeting. All nominations are to be submitted to the Election Secretary.

SECTION 2. The Board of Directors will appoint an Election Secretary to officiate the election. All nominations will be presented to the Election Secretary. The Election Secretary will provide a listing of all nominees to the membership via the Chapter website, the Chapter newsletter, and e-mail at least 30 days prior to the Annual meeting. Nominees will provide the Election Secretary a Candidacy Statement of not more than 250 words to be included with this listing. Ballots will be distributed to the membership via the Chapter website, the Chapter newsletter and e-mail with the listing of all nominees; the ballots are to be returned to the Election Secretary by the date specified on the ballot. Each ballot must contain the membership number of the voting member; ballots will not be accepted after the date specified by the Election Secretary.

SECTION 3. The Election Secretary will announce the results of the election at the Annual Meeting, based on ballots that have been received by the date specified.

SECTION 4. If a vacancy occurs between elections, the vacancy shall be filled by a voting member appointed by the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors may, at its discretion, appoint a voting member to assume the duties of any officer who is absent or incapacitated. or otherwise unable to perform the duties of the office.

SECTION 5. In those elections where there is only one candidate for each and every position covered by the election, the Board of Directors need not follow the provisions of Section 2 above. In such case, the Board of Directors shall announce the names of the candidates running for office without opposition on the Chapter website and in the Chapter newsletter; voting need not be required. The Election Secretary will ratify the election of the candidates at the annual meeting.

6. A mem-SECTION ber may hold only one concurrent Board position.

ARTICLE 6 – OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The Club shall have a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Social Director and two Officers-at-Large, all of whom shall be members of the Board of Directors. The elected officers shall appoint members to serve as coordinators for the newsletter, website, competitive events, technical events and membership as necessary.

SECTION 2. All Officers shall hold office for a period of one year, or the period of time that exists between successive annual meeting dates.

SECTION 3. Any Officer shall have the right to resign by submitting his resignation in writing to the Board of Direc-

SECTION 4. The President shall officiate at all meetings. The Vice-President shall officiate in the absence of the President. The Secretary shall maintain minutes of all meeting, carry on correspondence, keep all current Club records, and perform other duties as assigned by the Board of Directors. The Board may appoint members to assist the Secretary as needed. The Treasurer shall be responsible for all funds, making expenditures which are authorized by the Board and is required to submit a financial report at the annual meeting. No person shall incur an obligation to, nor commit the credit of the Club, except as specifically authorized by the Board. The Officers-at-Large shall perform such duties as deemed necessary by the Board.

SECTION 5. A motion for removal of an officer must be made at a regular meeting at least one month prior to a vote on said motion. An officer may

"Some of the most overlooked items during brake maintenance is the hardware associated with the brake system. This includes caliper mounting bolts, springs and pins for the brake shoes or pads.

For example return springs along with adjuster and shoe expander for drum brake shoes and internal parking brake shoes should be replaced during shoe replacement.

Floating style brake calipers need to have the caliper retaining spring replaced after four years Caliper guide screws should be cleaned only, no grease should be used on them as it will attract dirt. This would cause the caliper to not slide properly. Replace any damaged guide screws or bushings showing damage.

Properly lube pad contact points per repair instructions using approved brake contact paste. Torque guide screws and caliper bracket bolts to correct torque values.

On vehicles with fixed style calipers found on older classic vehicles and M-Sport vehicles installation of new pads is very important. Pad retaining pins and expanding springs need to be replaced on vehicles four years old and replaced every four years there after with pad replacement. Follow repair instructions for lubing contact points."

be removed by a 2/3 vote of the members' present, plus those voting by absentee ballot.

SECTION 6. The Board may appoint the Past President as a non-voting member of the Board for a term of one year.

ARTICLE 7 – MEETINGS

SECTION 1. Except as otherwise provided, general meetings will be called by the President or Board when necessary. A quorum shall be at least 4 Board members: a Board member is considered present either in person or via conference call. A meeting or event will be conducted every month. Membership will be notified of meetings/ events via the Chapter website, newsletter or e-mail at least five days prior to the meeting.

SECTION 2. The Board shall meet as deemed necessary by the President. A quorum shall be at least 4 Board members.

SECTION 3. The annual/ election meeting shall be held within the first three months of the year. In the event the annual meeting must be postponed, it will be held as close to the prescribed time as possible.

ARTICLE 8 -CORPORATION POWERS

SECTION 1. Except as herein provided, the Board shall exercise all powers of management of the corporation.

SECTION 2. The Board many name an activities committee as it sees fit, or may act as a committee of the whole. All committee members must be members of the Club.

SECTION 3. It shall be the policy of the Board to consult the members on any matters involving general welfare and conduct of the Club. Failure to do so shall not affect any vote of the Board.

ARTICLE 9 – DUES

SECTION 1. Dues are paid to the Chapter by the BMW Car Club of America, Inc on the behalf of each member.

ARTICLE 10 -**PERSONAL LIABILITY**

SECTION 1. All persons or corporations extending credit to, contracting with, or having any claim against the Club or Board shall only look to the funds and property of the Club for payment of any debt, damages, judgment or decree or any other money that may become due and payable to them from the Club or the Board so that neither the members of the Club nor its Board are personally liable therefore.

ARTICLE 11 – AMENDMENTS


SECTION 1. These By Laws may be amended by:

1) a 2/3 vote of the members present at any meeting plus those members voting by absentee ballot. Notification of the proposed amendments and an explanation of the subject shall be sent to the membership at least one month prior to the voting date; or

2) a 34 vote of the Board of Directors at any time.


ARTICLE 12 - ADDITIONS




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
